DARCY CLASS

What a busy month March has been! Darcy class have spent the last few weeks really getting stuck into the current learning cycle ("You make me feel brand new!" – learning about and exploring the idea of change) and despite all the exciting events around school and changes to our own routines, we've all done our absolute best to make the most of our new topics.

We've all loved focusing on 'The Snail and the Whale' and really engaged with the story in a variety of formats. We've read, watched, signed and participated in a wonderful sensory story to tackle the familiar tale from a real variety of angles. We've been using the story as a vehicle for discussion on the roles of different characters within stories, focusing on the difference between 'main characters' and 'other characters' and stretching our use of language to describe characters by comparing and contrasting.

Darcy class have been incredible during PSHE this cycle; we've dedicated our lessons to discussing the changes that can happen to us as we get older. We were delighted that our brilliant learners all felt comfortable enough to share their feelings and every lesson has produced some insightful and honest discussion.

We also spent some of this time exploring the reasoning behind Purple Day, and got together to think about how to help our friends with epilepsy – once again demonstrating some very mature and empathic emotional skills, as well as working as a team to create a wonderful display.

In R.E, we've been using the period of lent to talk about personal growth. We asked the whole school to participate in our Gospel celebration by thinking about the things they need as individuals to grow into the best version of themselves and we were so grateful for the amount of suggestions we received!

All this aside; we've also continued to get crafty in the drawing room, enjoy our new weekly music therapy sessions, joined the party for Purple Day, watched (and participated!) in the school talent show and started practicing for our parts in the Easter Liturgy. We've only one week left before Easter and our last few days are set to be as busy as the rest – hopefully we can manage to take the time and enjoy it before, this too, whizzes past all too quickly.





STIRLING CLASS



Stirling have been busy achieving a range of individual targets through our theme for this cycle, 'You make me feel brand new'. This kick started with learners gaining knowledge of vital organs in our body from our topic subject. This progressed to them reading the story, 'Pig Heart Boy', in which they have gained insight into the difficulties faced by those experiencing serious health needs and thoughts around the ethical issues around certain medical procedures.



For numeracy learners have been engaged in measuring people's weights and heights, converting such measurements and calculating BMI's to support our healthy lifestyle choices.



To reinforce our healthy lifestyle approach, learners gained a wonderful experience when a Saracens rugby coach taught the group a number of sessions on site which culminated in a trip the Saracens stadium. A trip thoroughly enjoyed by all. Learners were involved in a simulated problem-solving an activity in which a visitor set them a series of practical challenges that as a group, they had to work together to solve.

Most recently, the class organised another food culture event, this time visiting the culinary delights of Poland in honour of our many polish colleagues. There was a popular turn out of staff and students. It also coincided with Purple Day. This is a day to remember and reflect on all those living with epilepsy. A topic close to our hearts and one in which learners created thought provoking work that was displayed at the event.



JUBILEE CLASS

March has been a busy and exciting month for our learners! We have enjoyed a variety of engaging activities that have supported learning across different subjects and brought plenty of smiles along the way.

Learners in Jubilee had a wonderful time dressing up for World Book Day. They also had the special experience of being read to by a mystery reader—a delightful surprise that made the day even more magical! Another highlight was our Reading in a Strange Place activity, where learners had the unique opportunity to enjoy their books while reading to the chickens!

Learners have completed a range of activities where they choose and use appropriate standard units to estimate and measure length/height in any direction (m/cm); mass (kg/g); temperature (°C); and capacity (litres/ml) to the nearest appropriate unit, using rulers, scales, thermometers, and measuring liquids in various jugs. This practical experience is helping them develop essential measurement skills that apply to everyday life.

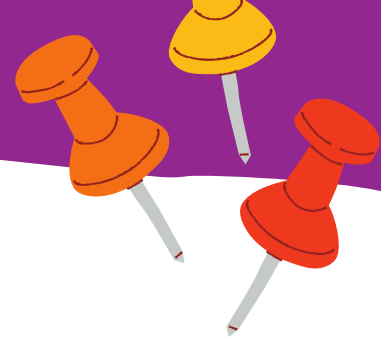
Our theme for this cycle is Healthy Body, Healthy Mind. The learners have explored what a healthy diet is by sorting foods into healthy and unhealthy categories and discussing what makes a well-balanced plate. This hands-on learning is helping them develop a greater understanding of nutrition and healthy eating habits.

This cycle, learners will be exploring Lent and giving, focusing on the story of Jesus in the desert and the cost and rewards of giving. Through discussions and role-play, they have been exploring different scenarios of the Stations of the Cross, sequencing them in the correct order, and developing their understanding of why Jesus went through those difficult times. They are also drawing comparisons to their own lives, building resilience, and reflecting on how they can overcome challenges in their daily experiences.

Over the past few weeks, Jubilee class has had the exciting opportunity to be coached by a professional rugby player from Saracens Rugby Club. The learners have been developing their rugby skills, including running with the ball, throwing, and catching. To make the experience even more special, they were invited to visit Saracens Rugby Club, where they spent the morning training at the main club—an unforgettable experience for all involved!



PIPPIN CLASS



Pippin class has been incredibly busy and engaged in so many wonderful activities lately! The "Good Life" cycle has been a fantastic way to explore the growth and development of plants and how that connects to the growth of our own class. Going to Ashvale every Wednesday has helped us learn about how things like school and loved ones help you all grow!



In maths we have been continuing measuring objects in various ways to show 'full' and 'empty' and 'big' and 'small'. We've had some awesome celebrations - World Book Day, Red Nose Day, and Purple Day and the school talent show which has added so much fun and excitement to the month!



The food tech lessons have been delicious, we've made hot cross buns, sausage rolls, and chicken wraps. And the Pathway 3 showcase was an amazing way to share all the amazing things we've been learning with parents, from reflexology to sensory regulation exercises with the parachute!

WONDER CLASS

What a busy month we have had here in Wonder Class! We enjoyed celebrating World Book Day, Red Nose Day and Purple Day with a range of musical, creative and sensory activities and experiences both in class and across the wider site. We have also been making the most of the warmer weather and sunshine, taking our explorations outdoors and embracing 'The Good Life' in nature.

We have continued our Sensory Story 'Up in the Garden and Down in the Dirt' with some superb communication, making comments on our explorations and the story, as well as expressing our choices and preferences. The 'sticky' slugs have proved to be a firm favourite, as have the vibrating bees and scurrying spiders!

In RE we have been creating sensory trays to explore the Gospel message and key stories from the Bible. By touching, feeling, and experiencing different textures and materials related to each story, we have been able to listen, reflect, respond and share our experiences in meaningful ways. It has been wonderful to see everyone's active investigations and we look forward to continuing our creative explorations and reflections on how each story connects to our daily lives.

Our work on our physical skills has also been a highlight this month, from amazing bench sitting whilst taking part in activities to exploring the therapy swing and active movement in Rebound Therapy. We have also worked incredibly hard on our fine motor skills, building strength and coordination when touching, moving, and using our hands and fingers in different ways and it has been fantastic to witness everyone's hard work and see how our skills are beginning to transfer across different activities.





BRAMLEY CLASS

In Bramley this month, we proudly celebrated Purple Day to raise awareness for epilepsy. Students and staff dressed in purple to show their support, and we engaged in activities to share our stories and visited the college to spend time with peers around the site.



Our recent visits to Hylands Park have been a fantastic opportunity for students to explore nature and enjoy outdoor learning. WINSTON CLASS

In maths, we have been learning about the different units of Measure. The students have been learning about length, capacity, as well as mass and weight. The students have enjoyed applying their knowledge and skills into real life practical scenarios.

In literacy, we have been focusing on narrative using the story "The Snail and the Whale". The students have really enjoyed working on this text. It has been a great resource to explore rhyming words as well as develop their describing skills when considering the different characters in the story.

Winston class are back at the farm this cycle and loving it. The students have been lucky enough to feed the new born lambs as well as walk the pigmy goats and check up on the newly born piglets. The students work incredibly hard at the farm to help with cleaning and feeding the animals and it has been great to see them working collaboratively as a part of a team.

We have also celebrated Red Nose Day! We held a St Elizabeth's Talent show in the hall to celebrate – which lots of students took part in and was thoroughly enjoyed by everyone. There were 3 students from Winston Class that took part – we had singing and dancing acts as well as a double act telling jokes. Staff were so proud to see the students so confident on stage.

To celebrate such a wonderful month of learning, Winston Class will be going to the cinema. We started a class incentive called "Caught you being great!" and when students are caught being just that they earn a star in the jar. DISCOVERY CLASS



What a fantastic month March has been! We have had so many wonderful experiences and we are excited to share them with you.

We kicked off the month by celebrating Saint David's day. We had a great time learning about the traditions and history behind the Welsh holiday. They embraced the spirit of the day by participating in activities like creating daffodil crafts, eating Welsh cakes and wearing daffodil costumes. We also celebrated Saint Patrick's Day. We took part in some Irish dancing and made some shamrock collages. It was a wonderful opportunity to teach the children about different cultures and celebrations.



We had an exciting trip to Play 360. The children had an absolute blast running, climbing and exploring the various play areas. In Literacy our focus has been on the delightful story 'Room on the broom' by Julia Donaldson. Children have been learning more about the characters and have also been sequencing the story and trying to retell it themselves. We encourage you to read 'Room on the Broom' at home as well if you haven't already. It's a wonderful way to reinforce their learning and enjoy some quality time together.



We have been making the most of the warmer weather and have been enjoying our daily walks around the school. These outdoor activities are not only a chance for the children to enjoy the fresh air, but they also provide valuable opportunities for learning and exploration. We have been looking for the first signs of spring and enjoying the beauty of the world around us. In addition to our daily walks we've also been spending more time in the park. This has been a wonderful opportunity for the children to engage in physical activity, work on their social skills and enjoy the outdoor play equipment.



This month we have introduced dough disco and pen disco into our daily routine. These activities are designed to help develop important fine motor skills all while having a great time. Dough disco is a fun activity where the children used play-dough to strengthen their hand muscles and improve their fine motor coordination. As the children follow along to music, they mould and shape the dough making patterns, squeezing, rolling and pinching.

BEACON CLASS

Beacon class have enjoyed a full on, fun packed March. We started the month with a celebration of all thing's books! This was a wonderful opportunity to celebrate reading in many different forms including sensory stories, story massages, group reading and colourful semantics. Students visited the reading garden to share their favourite books with staff and peers. This was a huge success and loved by all of Beacon class. To demonstrate our love of books, we created a music video for St Elizabeth's social media, to showcase places we like to read.

On Ash Wednesday, we went to the chapel to take part in a special mass where we received the ashes from last year's palms and a blessing. We discussed what we could all do for lent as a class and explored temptation, through the story of Adam and Eve. Each Thursday morning, we practice our gross motor skills, teamworking and sportsmanship through a series of friendly games. We have enjoyed working with others, making friends and showing off our skills. We participated in CAFOD Day, promoting kindness and charity. As a class we made some bread rolls and tomato soup, which we shared with our St Elizabeth's family to raise awareness and money for the charity.

In PSHE we have been learning about our bodies and our brains. As part of neurodiversity week, we explored the social story "Our brains are thinking machines" and discussed our own emotions and how our brains can feel if we are ill. We completed some physical brain gym activities and created some beautiful artwork for our purple epilepsy awareness day.

Beacon Class have had Music with George this month. We have been listening to different sounds and instruments. We have been learning songs and the art of copying patterns using speed and pace. It has been wonderful to see students partake, respond and enjoy such a vast range of music. For red nose day Beacon class took inspiration from our music sessions and made a video called "singing in the rain" where we showcased our signing, dancing and learning this term for our friends to enjoy. We had so much fun making this video and even more fun seeing ourselves on the screen - we now feel famous!





HONEY CLASS

March has been an exhilarating month for Honey class, filled with adventures that have both educated and entertained our students.



Our visit to the Warner Bros. Studio Tour was nothing short of enchanting. Students explored authentic sets from the Harry Potter films, including the Great Hall and Diagon Alley, and marvelled at original props and costumes. The tour enriched our learning in Literacy where we have been learning about Harry Potter, bringing the story to life for Honey class. It has been a definite highlight of this month!



Our trip to 360 Play in Stevenage offered a dynamic environment where students engaged in active and imaginative play. There was a large soft play area where the children burned off a lot of energy, a role-play street that sparks creativity, and several themed stations including Lego. The children loved exploring the props cupboard, dressing up in costumes, and letting their imaginations run wild.



Alongside our exciting trips, the children have been actively engaging in new topics this term. In P.E., they've been developing their football skills—learning to pass, play in teams, call each other's names for communication, and take penalty shootouts.



In Food tech our students have been exploring their culinary creativity by preparing a variety of sweet treats. They whipped up some rice Krispie cakes with white chocolate and lucky charms marshmallows, showcasing their ability to follow recipes and measure ingredients. Additionally, they enhanced their chopping skills while helping with CAFOD soup day, demonstrating teamwork and an eagerness to learn practical cooking techniques. Meanwhile in Ashvale, students have been delving into the fascinating world of herbology (linking to Harry Potter).

They have been learning about different types of herbs, their uses and the science behind planting seeds. This hands-on experience has allowed them to explore the wonders of nature and develop their understanding of how plants grow.

We've also enjoyed shaking and moving with pom poms and a giant parachute, creating some wonderful colourful waves and patterns. We had an amazing class trip to 360 Soft Play!

In phonics, we've been concentrating on the 'm' sound. We've had some exciting taste tests, trying marmite, meringue, and mango! We've also been practising mixing different materials, which has been a fun and hands-on way to reinforce the 'm' sound.

We've been showing lots of love to our super mummies by locating and identifying pictures of them. It's been heart-warming to see the children's faces light up as they recognise their mums.

Plus, we've been busy in the kitchen, cooking and sampling new foods—an exciting way to introduce different flavours and healthy eating!

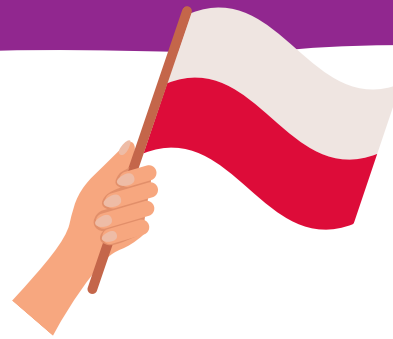

PURPLE DAY



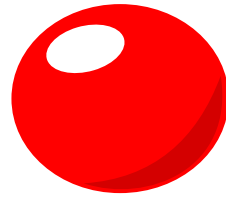

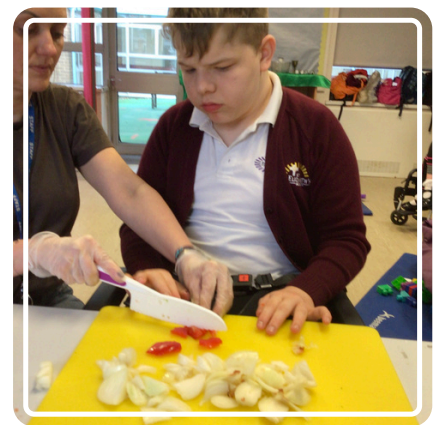
CAFOD LENT FAMILY FAST DAY

I have decided to challenge myself the way my mental health challenged me in 2023 when I lost my Grandad.

I have chosen to cycle around the island of Malta as it has been my second home since I was little and holds a deep connection to my family and I.

This challenge includes cycling the distance of 85 miles within 9 hours. Tough To Talk's mission is to reduce male suicide rates by empowering men to speak openly about their struggles.

The phrase "man up" has always been used as a way to tell someone to toughen up and deal with difficult situations rather than speak up and ask for help. Tough to Talk's aim is to break this stigma and use "man up" as a way to tell someone to speak up, seek help and support each other.
