During this academic year, Group I have undertaken a range of exciting City & Guilds Units. They were able to develop greater confidence in the community by using public transport. They each had the opportunity to use the bus and train to visit local parks in Bishop's Stortford and Harlow. Our group visited a range of settings such as Outdoor pursuits, places of worship and places of interest such as the sea life centre. The purpose of the visits was to learn about how to behave in the community; to build confidence in travelling; and develop interests outside of college.

The learners engaged beautifully with their Independent Living Skills lessons where they had weekly shop, cook and eat sessions. It was good fun planning recipes and shopping lists before going to a local supermarket to find the ingredients. The learners then made a wide range of dishes such as chorizo pilaf, stir fry, pizza and Thai green chicken curry. Our learners have been gaining work experience at our charity shops. A big thank you to the staff and the Harlow and Ware branches. The shops have been able to expose our young people to understanding the world of work by undertaking work experience. A typical day at the shop could be from talking to customers to sorting the clothes.

One of our learners expressed his enjoyment at his time at the shop and liked the responsibility he had. He checked the quality of the clothes and then ensured the clothes sizes matched the size number on the hanger.

Another learner has helped to reorganise the entertainments section in the Ware shop. He made a huge difference in making this area more appealing to the customers.





#### The Drawing Room

It has been a wonderful year in The Drawing Room. The learners have made some lovely creations and learnt lots of new skills. The first project they undertook was to make a utensil holder from clay. They developed the skills to roll the clay to the correct depth and sticking the clay together using 'slip'. Slip is old clay mixed with water that acts like a glue. Learners then decorated the vases using different instruments to make different textures. The final part of the process was glazing it with their choice of colours.

Another learning activity was designing an apron to wear for their cookery lessons. The design themes were food. The learners become increasingly more confident drawing fruit and vegetables and it was wonderful watching them draw and then make those improvements to make it even better by adding more detail.

In addition, the creativity continued by designing a tea pot using London themed transfers. The learners had to carefully choose and cut around the design and follow the instructions to apply it without creases. It required a lot of concentration!

The last project of the year was to make and decorate a cake plate using all their new skills, ready for the graduation celebration. The learners raised over £70 for their work during the summer fayre which is a fantastic achievement!

#### Ashvale

In Ashvale this term the learners have been getting their produce ready to sell. They have been collecting and washing the chicken eggs, washing produce such as onions and garlic, and putting price tags onto the tomato plants that they grew last term.

This week each group have gone out to the school, college, supported living bungalows, and down into the main corridor to the offices to sell their items. They were really happy with the amount of food they sold.
